The Ten Commandments The Apostles' Creed

The Catechism – The Eighth Commandment You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

Large Catechism - Besides our own body, our spouse, and our temporal property, we have one more treasure that is indispensable to us, namely, our honor and good reputation. For it is important that we not live among people in public disgrace and dishonor. Therefore God does not want our neighbors deprived of their reputation, honor, and character any more than of their money and possessions; he wants everyone to maintain self-respect before spouse, child, servant, and neighbor. "Bearing false witness" is nothing but a work of the tongue. God wants to hold in check whatever is done with the tongue against a neighbor. Rather, we should use our tongue to speak only the best about all people, to cover the sins and infirmities of our neighbors, to justify their actions, and to cloak and veil them with our own honor. Our chief reason for doing this is the one that Christ has given in the gospel, and in which he means to encompass all the commandments concerning our neighbor, "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you. – *Large Catechism*

Memory Verse – Let your "Yes" be "Yes," and your "No," "No." For whatever is more than these is from the evil one (Matt. 5:37).

The Lord's Prayer Morning or Evening Prayer (From the Small Catechism) Hymn of the Week: Lord, Thee I Love with All My Heart (LSB 708)

Hymn of the Week: "Lord, Thee I Love with All My Heart," was penned by Martin Schalling (1532-1608). Though not well known outside Lutheranism, this hymn ranks among the most powerful text in all hymnody. Throughout this hymn, we see five main themes:

(1) Hope and faith can be placed only in Christ ('Lord, Thee I love').

(2) The worst evils, including death itself, may not be far off in a sinful world ('And should my heart for sorrow break').

(3) In the midst of 'this poor life of labor,' God's strong presence is a reality

('Thy precious blood my soul has bought').

(4) Temptations and threats against one's faith are real ('Let no false doctrine me beguile').

(5) From the Christian's perspective, the end of this life is the beginning of joy in the next ('Lord, let at last Thine angels come').

Singing this hymn is a way to acknowledge our deepest fears in life today, answering them with the hope that comes only through Christ, now seated in glory, who will call us to share in that glory when we rise from the dead.
