CATECHETICAL THEME:

What Is Confession

This Week's Catechetical Theme: What Is Confession

The word "confess," literally means in the Greek: "to say the same." And while we quickly think of the Confession of Sins, the word can be used in three ways: 1) to confess Christ; 2) to confess the Lord's teaching; and 3) to confess sin. In each case, to confess is "to say the same" as God has already spoken in Holy Scripture. Indeed, whenever we are faithfully confessing, we are simply saying what the Lord has given us to speak—we are speaking His words back to Him. We begin this catechetical section on Confession and the Keys by considering the faithful confession placed on the lips of Christians by the Holy Spirit that we have sinned against God by "thought, word, and deed." Indeed, whether it was the Prodigal Son of Luke 15, King David in Psalm 51, or any time a person confesses his or her sins, it is always a confession of what God has already revealed to be true. To confess sin, then, is to say what the Bible teaches us to say. Thankfully, the Lord is faithful and just to forgive the confessing sinner, and to cleanse him or her from all unrighteousness. God bless your time in His Word!

What is confession?

Confession has two parts. First, that we confess our sins, and second, that we receive absolution, that is, forgiveness, from the pastor as from God Himself, not doubting, but firmly believing that by it our sins are forgiven before God in heaven.
