CATECHETICAL THEME:

4th & 5th Petitions of the Lord's Prayer

This Week's Catechetical Theme: The 4th & 5th Petitions of the Lord's Prayer

This week, our catechetical focus is on the Fourth and Fifth Petitions of the Lord's Prayer. In the 4th Petition, that is, "give us this day our daily bread," we pray for everything that has to do for the support and needs of the body. In the Large Catechism, Martin Luther writes of this petition: "You see, in this way, God wishes to show us how He cares for us in all our need and faithfully provides also for our earthly support. He abundantly grants and preserves these things, even for the wicked and rogues (Matt. 5:45). Yet, He wishes that we pray for these goods in order that we may recognize that we receive them from His hand and may feel His fatherly goodness toward us in them (Psalm 104:28). For when He withdraws His hand, nothing can prosper or be maintained in the end. Indeed, we daily see this and experience it" (LCIII 82-83).

In the Fifth Petition, that is, "And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us," Luther writes: "It is, therefore, the intent of this petition that God would not regard our sins and hold up to us what we daily deserve. But we pray that He would deal graciously with us and forgive, as He has promised, and so grant us a joyful and confident conscience to stand before Him in prayer [Hebrews 10:22]." As God's own dear children, we are those who are freely forgiven for the sake of Christ. And being the recipient of such free grace, we have the privilege of freely extending it to those who sin against us. God bless your time in His Word this week as you consider the Fourth and Fifth Petitions of the Lord's Prayer!

The Catechism: 4th & 5th Petitions of the Lord's Prayer

Give us this day our daily bread. *What does this mean?* God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

What is meant by daily bread? Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.

And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. *What does this mean?* We pray in this petition that our Father in heaven would not look at our sins, or deny our prayer because of them. We are neither worthy of the things for which we pray, nor have we deserved them, but we ask that He would give them all to us by grace, for we daily sin much and surely deserve nothing but punishment. So we too will sincerely forgive and gladly do good to those who sin against us.
